

FROM THE CHAIR

It has been a transformative year for the Living Future Institute of Australia (LFIA). I was very honoured to be chosen as the new Chair at the 2016 AGM, taking over from the wonderful Mary Casey. In my first year as Chair I have been blown away by what we have achieved and the amazing people and organisations that have supported us.

In late 2016, we were delighted to appoint one of the LFIA's previous Board Directors Stephen Choi as our first Executive Director. Throughout the year, Stephen has provided an extraordinary contribution to the LFIA and led the organisation in achieving some significant milestones.

We welcmoed some fantastic new Board members in late 2016 and collectively the Board set some ambitious targets for 2017. This included partnerships and sponsorships, events, increasing our following, launching Declare and offering new services. I am pleased to say that we have made significant ground across these areas and continue to grow the presence of the LFIA and a strong network of individuals and organisations that want to work with us to create a Living Future. A future that is socially just, culturally rich and ecologically restorative.

As you read the annual report you will get a sense of what the LFIA has achieved over the past 12 months. It's hard to pick just a few personal highlights but here goes.

both speakers and attendees made these very memorable events and something that we will build on over the coming year.

Next is the launch of Declare in Australia, which now allows the LFIA to issue Declare labels to products locally. A number of products have already received their labels and this will continue to grow in 2018.

It also inspiring to see the interest that is building towards Australian projects targeting the Living Building Challenge (LBC). The Australian property sector has notched up some significant achievements in delivering green buildings however some of the upcoming LBC projects will take this to the next level. The LFIA will continue to support these projects and hope to share more with you about them in 2018.

Finally, I want to give a special mention to some Board members whose term has come to an end. Mary Casey, Caroline Pidcock and Brian Coughlin have collectively contributed immensely to the LFIA over several years. On behalf of the LFIA we thank them for their contribution and look forward to their support in other capacities in future.

To everyone reading this, your support is vital for us to continue making an impact towards a living future. The financial support we have received over the past year has been amazing. We will also continue to call on your voices and actions as active proponents of a Living Future, and request your feedback and your commitment to change.

We thank each and every one of you, our supporters, our partners, our volunteers, staff and Board members for your efforts and support during the year. We couldn't achieve what we do without you.

SYMPOSIUM

In September 2017, the LFIA held its very first Symposium to bring together inspiring thinkers and doers to define, redefine, examine, and challenge what a 'Living Future' could really mean across multiple communities and multiple industries.

Centring on the theme of untold stories, the event commenced aboard the Mari Nawi boat upon departure from the Sydney Opera House, on the journey to the heritage listed Quarantine Station in Sydney's North Head National Park. Once there, participants heard from the inspirational Tony McAvoy SC and Kirsti Luke, who shared how their cultures had thrived for thousands of years, and to capture the lessons that we can all apply in our lives and workplaces. The remainder of the day included a range of high energy, intimate and engaging workshops, that looked deep into the subject matter.

The event was an overwhelming success with participants bringing their best selves to the Symposium to help realise a 'Living Future' in Australia and beyond. Feedback indicates that participants left feeling elated, excited, inspired, motivated, energised and invigorated.

Other events included a Before-After Party which was hosted by the Sydney Living Building Challenge
Collaborative to provide participants
with an opportunity to get to know one
another in a fun and lighthearted way.
Running alongside the Symposium was
the Student UnSymposium where teams
of students had five hours to showcase
their brilliance by responding to a Living
Building Challenge brief.

A diverse mix of 170 people made up the Symposium, representing more than 90 different organisations. Professional backgrounds included artist, architect, contractor, ecologist, developer, engineer, educator, certifier, manufacturer, supplier, government, student and various senior sustainability consultants.

The Symposium also considerably increased the reach of the Living Future Institute of Australia. Twitter and LinkedIn both received more than 10,000 unique impressions; our Facebook followers doubled and over 100 new contacts were added to our database.

Carbon generated through the Symposium added to 33.2 tonnes, and was offset through a verified carbon standard that protects Tasmanian native forest.

We can't wait to do it all again next time!

FORUMS

This year the institute made another leap into the event space, with the goal of lifting the bar and showing what's possible in the built environment.

Focused on the theme of Building Nutrition, the events in Sydney and Adelaide showed delegates why and how to bring health, happiness and wellbeing into the workplace.

The point of difference for the Forums were that there was an equal amount of time spent listening as there was doing. A format was adopted to really engage the people that paid to be in the room. This was done through active learning activities, predominantly facilitated round table discussions. Each participant

at each table had a different coloured marker, and were encouraged to be generous with their note taking, and to share their ideation process

The Forums were both wildly popular events, with Sydney and Adelaide drawing 60 and 39 people respectively. While the different locations proved to attract different sectors, each Forum had about one-third of participants representing an architecture practice. It was pleasing to see a strong turnout from government and developers.

In 2018 the Living Future Institute of Australia will look to deliver new Forums, focusing on the most pressing issues.



Green Star-Design & As Built/ Living Building Challenge 3.1

Approaches to buildings or fitouts seeking a dual rating







Joining the sixteen registered projects in Australia, we commend Fraser Property Australia on their Burwood Brickworks Retail project, which has gone from being the subject of last year's incredibly successfully international Living Building Challenge Design Competition to preparing to start on site in 2018, aiming to become the world's first retail Living Building.

In April 2017 the Crosswalk document for the Living Building Challenge 3.1 and Green Star Design & As Built was released as part of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Green Building Council of Australia. The Crosswalk aims to simplify the process for projects seeking both certifications.

DECLARE

The LFIA has established a Partnership Agreement with the ILFI to allow the LFIA to locally prepare labels for approval by the ILFI, and share the associated revenue. The LFIA has also been promoting the take- up of manufacturers and suppliers seeking Declare labels at events throughout the year and through the LFIA's involvement with the LBC projects. In the past year, eight Australian Declare labels have been Webglas GC - Ampelite issued.

The provision of a local Declare program is seen as a fundamental tenet for the future financial stability of the LFIA.

JUST
